


Tough skin


- Difficult to peel

The Lens Principle



- You are the lens through which you view the world
- Who you are determines what you see
- We see others as we are, each of us has our own leanings
- Who we are determines how we see others
- What we see, how you see others, how you view life, what you do
- 5 things that determine who we are:
 - Genetics
 - Self Image
 - Experiences in Life
 - Attitudes and Choices about those experiences
 - Friends

The Mirror Principle



- Look in the Mirror
- Know yourself
- The first person we must examine is ourselves
- Coping with difficult people is always a problem
- Especially if that person happens to be you
- Everything starts from you
- Learn to be your own best friend first
- Learn to build healthy relationships

The Pain Principle



- Hurting people hurt people and are in turn hurt by them
- When dealing with difficult, hurtful people remember that they are a hurting person
- Don't take their actions personally
- Look beyond the people to the problem
- Don't hurt the hurting
- Help them find help

The Hammer Principle



- Conflict is inevitable
- Savvy leaders know how to manage tone and temperature when dealing with conflict
- Be careful not to put winning the argument ahead of winning the person
- Listen, ask questions, listen some more, ask more questions then ponder before responding
- Timing is a big deal when faced with need for confrontation
- Never use a hammer to swat a fly off someone's head

The Elevator Principle

Seven held over canning bishop

The Bishop of the Seventhday Adventist (SDA) Church of Western Uganda Field (WUF), Samuel Mwebaza, is nursing injuries after a group of Christians attacked and canned him on Tuesday.

Mwebaza was dragged out of his office at the WUF headquarters in Fort Portal town at around 1:00pm and canned.

The angry Christians, whom the Police allege were led by lonathan Kihumum, accused the hishop of mismanagement of church funds and failing several projects which they had initiated.

It mok the intervention of the offices to rescue him as more Christians advanced towards him with sticks and stones

Kihumuro, who is being held at Fort Portal central Police station on charges of assaulting the man of God, church, said several projects, including construction of a church and health centre have stalled

Grace Kabugweri, another member of the SDA church accused the bishop of disrespecting church members. from central Uganda.

"As members of the SDA church in Rwenzori region, we thought it was wise if we could bring back to order our bishop people around the bishop's by canninh him," Kabagweri

> the church She said members' intention was not to kill bishop Mwebaza, but rather punish him for the slowed development in the

"We tried to advise him for many years, but he did not adhere to our advice for over due to the mismanagement of two years, so we decided to punish him," Kabagweri said.

However, other sources blamed the incident on tribal sentiments. Mwebaza hails

The Christians accused the bishop of mismanaging church funds and failing to run several projects which they had initiated.

"It started like drama and we didn't expect the Christians to behave like that; we thought they were shooting a video but all of the sudden they started beating the bishop. We called the Police but they arrived Patrick Kasangaki, businessman in Fort Portal said.

Besides Kihumuro, others arrested are Amos Mugenvi,

Kakwezi. Moses Mutegeki, Bob Kaheebwa and Joshua Kakwezi, all members of the church, according to Lydia Tumushabe, the Rwenzori West regional police spokesperson. The seventh person who was arrested had not been identified by press time. "It was an embarrassment canning a bishop in public. He has reported a case of assault at Fort Portal Central Police Station and we have seven people in custody, "Tumushabe said.

She said the Christians stole the bishop's valuables and damaged his laptop during the scuffle.

Other incidents of assault

This is not the first time churchgoers in Uganda turn against their prelates. In February 2002, the congregation at St Andrew's Cathedral, Sesame in Kisoro were thrown into a panic when Bishop Ernest Shalita, who was in the process of sitting down, suddenly cried out in pain, clutching the seat of his cassock. Shalita, the then bishop of Muhabura Protestant Diocese, was pricked by needles believed to have been planted in his throne by unscrupulous church members.

Bishop Kityo Luwalira of Namirembe Diocese also survived being beaten when a man, clutching sticks, tried to attack him on the pulpit as he was about to start last year's Easter Sunday service. The bishop was only saved by a bar at the altar, which trapped the man before worshippers overpowered him.

was hunting for other suspects because the group was big. After investigations, they will be arraigned in court to answer charges of assault.

"The bishop is the complainant in this case. He reported the case at Police and we immediately started investigations. We condemn such acts," Tumushabe said.

Stephen Asiimwe, the Resident District Commissioner for Kabarole condemned the actions of the Christians.

"That is indiscipline on the side of church members attacking a bishop with sticks and canning him. We shall not She added that the Police entertain that nonsense; all

those who participated in the beating will be hunted down and arrested," he said.

"It was a big embarrassment to the bishop and we have asked the head of the SDA church in Uganda to intervene because they have been embroiled in many wrangles." he explained.

By press time, the bishop could not be traced as his phone was off and his offices in Fort Portal town remained closed.

Defamation




- Defined as the action of damaging the reputation of someone by slander or libel
